## Dr. Jean Lau Chin, "The Role of Women in the Chinese Family"

Jean Lau Chin (EdD, Columbia University, Teachers College) is a psychologist and Professor at Adelphi University. Her career of more than 40 years of experience includes significant leadership roles within academia as dean at Adelphi University and Systemwide Dean at Alliant International University, and within health service delivery systems as Director of the Thom Clinic and Executive Director of the South Cove Community Health Center. Currently, she is Council Leadership Team Chair and on the Board of Directors of the American Psychological Association, President of the International Council of Psychologists. In addition to her clinical and consulting practice, she has published 18 books and numerous publications and professional talks on diversity, leadership, Asian American, and women's issues. She was editor of the Special Issue on Diversity and Leadership in the American Psychologist (April 2010), author of Women and Leadership (2007) and co-author of Diversity and Leadership (2015). She is a Fulbright Scholar as Distinguished Chair in Cultural Competence at the University of Sydney in Australia and has engaged in leadership development training for women and ethnic minorities.

## Dr. John Thornell

I came to Delta State in 1975 as a faculty member, having completed my doctorate from the University of Texas. After a few years I moved into administration and served in different positions, including dean, provost, and interim president. I loved history and completed a masters in history while at Delta State. I began to teach history part-time and moved my faculty appointment to that department in the 1990's. My interests extended to the history of the Delta and the challenges encountered by various ethnic groups. I began to study the Chinese and the Italians. I met with DSU professor, John Quon, and discussed doing an oral history of Delta Chinese families. He encouraged me to do so and offered his support. I received a grant from the Mississippi Humanities Council to do the project. I hired three students to help with interviews. I used the results to publish several articles and present papers at conferences, mainly the the Southern Asian Studies Conference. My work led me to develop great appreciation for the Delta Chinese. I concluded my role as provost at Delta State in 2007 and took a similar position in North Carolina. I moved to Alabama in 2009 to be provost of the University of North Alabama (UNA). I concluded that role in 2017 and am now a faculty member in the UNA history department. I teach US history and Civil War. I recently did an oral history of a Chinese faculty member at UNA and her experiences living through the cultural revolution.

MDCHM provided a backdrop to many of the on-camera interviews with area residents adding authenticity and color to a very important part of Mississippi's common history. The archives and collections within MDCHM are unique and are available to researchers and filmmakers alike, providing a great benefit to all working to perpetuate Chinese American history, our presence and contributions to America. As an independent producer, I can say that if it were not for MDCHM, the documentary series **Honor and Duty: The Mississippi Delta Chinese** would not be as factual, rich and compelling as it is.

#### "South of Gold Mountain," H.T. Chen & Dian Dong

Choreographer **H.T. Chen** is distinguished for having created a body of works that address Chinese American immigration and labor. He is the recipient of numerous awards for choreography and has always believed that good art has social value. In addition to H.T. Chen & Dancers, H.T. and his wife Dian Dong founded a School serving over 400 children each week, and a black-box Theater in Chinatown, NY.

On this visit, they wish to reconnect with friends and families who contributed to the **South of Gold Mountain** project through oral histories, research information, and family photos. The project celebrated the lives and livelihoods of Chinese who settled in the American South and was presented to audiences nationwide. Excerpts of the work were also featured in educational performances by H.T. Chen & Dancers to over 20,000 young audiences so that they could learn this important chapter of Asian American history.

**Dian Dong**, a professional dancer and teacher, is 4<sup>th</sup> generation American born Chinese on her father's side of the family and 5<sup>th</sup> generation on her mother's side. She is a graduate of The Juilliard School's Dance Division, and in 2005 attended the Stanford Graduate School of Business – EPNL ARTS Program. Ms. Dong organizes and designs the education programs for Chen Dance Center's homebased and residency programs. She and H.T. Chen are the recipients of a Bessie's Citation, the NYS Governor's Arts Award and the 2012 Mid-Career Martha Hill Dance Fund. They are also the proud parents of two dancing daughters.

#### Delta Wok, Easton Selby & Gabriella Sang

The Mississippi Chinese have played a key role in the social and economic growth of the delta culture. It was agriculture that brought the families to the region, but it was a socio-economic bond through race that brought them into the groceries. Since the late 1800's Chinese groceries fed the families of the delta. The groceries were not just a place to purchase goods, but they were the homes and havens for Chinese families. It was in those stores that family meals were created, food was eaten, stories were told, and traditions were maintained; much like the traditional southern table. A traditional Chinese meal is how families were able to stay connected to their roots.

A Delta Wok is a collaborative project conceived by Emily Jones (Mississippi Delta Chinese Heritage Museum, **Easton Selby** (2003 Delta State University Alumnus, 2008 Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters award recipient for photography, and chair of Visual Arts at Coastal Carolina University,), and **Tim Hodge** (former student of Easton Selby and current M.F.A. candidate in photography, video and related media at the School for Visual Arts in Manhattan, NY). The idea developed through a previous collaboration by Jones and Selby. From 2009-2012 Selby worked on a collaborative photographic project about the geography of the Mississippi Delta blues. This work was exhibited at the Archives. While visiting family, and working on the blues project, Jones introduced Selby to Hoover Lee's "Hoover Sauce" and the history behind its production.

Exploring titles for this project, Jones and Selby took to heart the alluvial, bowl shape of the Delta and found that shape mirrored in the primary piece of all Chinese kitchens, the wok. Therefore, "The Delta Wok" seemed a perfect working title for this project. The Delta Wok was born out of a mutual love for foodways, such as the Hoover Lee story, the desire to promote the cultural history of the delta, and is most importantly an effort to preserve the legacy of the shrinking population of the Mississippi Delta Chinese.

The Delta Wok project aims to preserve this rich cultural tradition while educating the community through foodways-the intersectional explorations of culture, tradition, and history as told through the stories of cuisine. A short series of documentaries and ultimately a cookbook will explore the culinary trends and traditions of the Mississippi Delta Chinese. Our goal will be achieved through collected and archived stories of personal journeys, photographs of cooking traditions (past and present) and family recipes, while simultaneously perpetuating the education of an underserved culture that has historically woven race relations together in the Mississippi Delta.

#### Grocery Stor[i]es, Randy Kwan

Grocery stores have played an integral role in the establishment and development of the Chinese presence in the Mississippi Delta. While issues of segregation and equality swirled in the communities right outside grocery store doors, the Chinese families were blending their heritage with their new environment. Building from the photographs and oral histories collected within the Delta State University Archives' Chinese holdings, this project proposes to develop a traveling exhibit focusing on the lives lived within grocery stores, primarily focusing on the subjects of foodways and education. While the majority of our areas grocery stores no longer stand, this resource will demonstrate how the Delta's Chinese influenced change all from behind the doors and counters of their grocery stores.

This project will use images of interior and exterior grocery stores from the past with current images taken by Randy Kwan. Layering on top of the physical demonstration of the evolution of time, we will incorporate images of the lives lived within these spaces. Combined with the impact of the images, oral histories held in the University Archives as well as those collected specifically for this project, will provide the text and context for the images. In their own words and with their own images, the MS Delta Chinese will tell their stories.

#### Mississippi Digital Library

Mississippi's rich abundance of cultural and historical resources is held by institutions and repositories all across the state. Our mission at the Mississippi Digital Library (MDL) is to provide an online space to search and explore the wealth of materials available in Mississippi.

The MDL provides an online portal for discovery and access of digital collections throughout the state. In addition to access to materials we provide:

- Training- Digitization training at all stages of the digitization process from selecting equipment and handling materials to creating metadata.
- *Hosting- A digital collections platform for institutions that cannot host collections themselves.*
- Assistance- Limited digitization assistance through usage of specialized equipment and programs such as the Cultural Heritage Digitization Award

#### Heritage Corner, Raymond Seid

Upon graduation from Mississippi State in 1972 with degrees in Engineering and Business, I left Mississippi for a 30-year career in the US Public Health Service, 23 years of which were an assignment in San Francisco. I am now retired and living in Hawaii for the past 15 years. My time away from Mississippi has given me a new perspective on my Mississippi Delta Chinese roots. I'm a native son of Greenville, Mississippi. My exposure to Chinese people outside of Mississippi, particularly in San Francisco, Hawaii as well as in my ancestral village in China, has awakened my interest in Chinese culture and heritage, and specifically on the genealogy of my family clan, and others, to the point of becoming passionate about the subject. I am a current member of the Board of Directors for the Mississippi Delta Chinese Heritage Museum, and preserving our unique Mississippi Delta Chinese heritage is of utmost importance at this critical juncture as the Delta Chinese transcends from the grocery store era to becoming the educated professionals and business people in America. #### Dr. John Jung

John Jung reinvented himself as a public historian after retiring from 40 years as a professor of psychology. In the past decade, he published 5 books, blogged, and spoke on over 100 occasions about important aspects of the Chinese American experience to community groups, professional societies, universities, and historical museums across the country.
