## **COLLEGE OF EDUCATION AND HUMAN SCIENCES**

#### **New Programming**

Two new Specialist programs will begin fall 2021, the Educational Specialist in Curriculum and Instruction and the Educational Specialist in Higher Education.

#### **Accreditation**

The Counselor Education Program received full 8-year accreditation for its programs from the Council for the Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP).

In February 2021, the Hamilton-White Child Development Center received full accreditation through 2026 from the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC).

All educator preparation programs were fully recognized by the Mississippi Department of Education through 2027.

#### **Funding for Special Programming**

The Tri State Foundation awarded \$180,000 in funding to provide tuition scholarships for 20 candidates to pursue advanced degrees in educator and leadership preparation programs.

The Delta Sunflower Project, a partnership with the Sunflower Consolidated School District and funded through the Kellogg Foundation, completed its second year. This project included a total of \$399,996 in funding for the tuition of 22 residents across the first two cohorts. Three residents graduated in Spring 2021, and eight are expected to graduate in the next academic year. This means 11 new licensed teachers in the Sunflower Consolidated School District.

#### **Special Recognition**

Nicole Spinks and Dr. Jacqueline Goldman won top honors for their use of technology in teaching their classes, each receiving the DSU Student Engagement Educator Award.

The DSU Delta Sigma Upsilon chapter of Chi Sigma Iota was awarded the 2021 Chi Sigma Iota Outstanding Chapter Award.

Dr. Todd Davis received the Georgene Clark Diversity Champion Award.

#### **Special Events**

The Counselor Education Division held the 39<sup>th</sup> Virtual F.E. Woodall Conference with 222 attendees participating in 27 breakout sessions on a wide variety of multicultural topics in the mental health field. The event was coordinated by Ms. Chaley Brunetti, Counselor Education Lab Director.

OkraCamp, coordinated by Dr. Todd Davis, was delivered as an afterschool and Saturday program in the spring of 2021 to 60 campers, with parents participating in a special session. Camp activities included archery, paddle boarding, kayaking, canoeing, shooting BB guns, soccer, flag football, dodgeball, and floor hockey.

#### Accomplishments for Clinical Experiences, Licensure, and Accountability

In the 2020-21 academic year, the Office of Clinical Experiences, Licensure, and Accountability had one of the largest groups of student interns on record. There was a total of 102 undergraduate elementary and secondary interns, and 53 Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) interns. All 102 undergraduate interns received their bachelor's degree. Of the 53 MAT interns, 15 received their master's degree in spring 2021; approximately 30 are projected to earn their master's degree by the end of summer 2021.

## STUDENT SUCCESS CENTER

Established in Fall 2012, the Student Success Center helps students successfully navigate from classroom to cap and gown by offering a wide range of student support services tailored to meet the needs of DSU students. During the 2020-2021 academic year, major accomplishments included:

#### Academic Advising Services:

- Re-branded meta-majors to academic pathways to help guide undecided students to choose a major.
- Enrolled 38 new C2C students in 2020-21, with 25 students graduating via C2C during 2020-2021 academic year.
- Darla Poole, Coordinator of Academic Advising Services, presented at two virtual conferences, including one with DSU's international partner institution, Perm University.

#### **Academic Support Services:**

- Redesigned Academic Support Lab (CED 098/099), an academic readiness class for students with two or more deficient scores on the ACT, to hybrid format. Students met for class one day per week and were required to meet with the Coordinator for weekly academic coaching sessions.
- Acquired outside funding through the Woodward Hines Foundation and a subscription to tutor.com was established. Tutor.com is embedded into students' Canvas shells and offers free, 24/7 online tutoring support in a variety of subjects including drop-off writing services to improve students' writing quality for all classes which require writing components.
- Implemented Student Navigators Program. The pandemic caused a disconnect and less student interaction. Because of social distancing, students reported they are hesitant to reach out/ask for help. As an effective way to check on students, the Student Navigators program was established. The Navigators utilize peer-to-peer interaction through virtual check-ins via phone/email/social media. These check-ins include asking how the semester is going, issues/ challenges, and any concerns the students have during these unprecedented times.

#### **First Year Seminar:**

- Taught 416 first-year freshman and transfer students in FYS 100/103/300, in a 100% Hybrid format.
- Trained 19 FYS instructors in hybrid course design and delivery.
- Utilized FYS as perfect course for early alert, with correlation of r = .6 between FYS grade and overall term GPA.

#### International Education/Fulbright Office:

- Selected as one of nine new Japan Outreach Initiative (JOI) host sites by the Laurasian Institute for a fully funded Japanese cultural educator for 2020-2022. (Delayed by COVID).
- Assisted four students in applying for highly competitive Frederick Douglass Global Fellowship. While no DSU students were selected, but all four received Frederick Douglass Summer Scholar scholarship offers.

## **DELTA CENTER FOR CULTURE AND LEARNING**

#### MS Delta National Heritage Area

- The MS Delta National Heritage Area, a cultural heritage development partnership with the National Park Service that is managed by The Delta Center for Culture and Learning at Delta State, has generated nearly \$4 million in direct federal and state grants to the university since 2010.
- In response to COVID-19, the MS Delta National Heritage Area launched its online <u>Civil Rights</u> <u>Heritage Archive</u> in spring 2021 as an educational resource for MS Delta residents, students, researchers, and visitors.
- As a result, the National Park Service announced in June 2021 that <u>the MS Delta National Heritage</u> Area, has been selected for the National Park Service's African American Civil Rights Network.
- The MDNHA is the first of 55 Congressionally designated National Heritage Areas to be added to the African American Civil Rights Network, which points to key Civil Rights heritage development opportunities for the Mississippi Delta region in tourism, education, and interpretation.

#### International Delta Blues Project

- The Delta Center's "Spirit of the Blues: Celebrating Roots of Delta Music Through Spirituals and Gospel" initiative is supported by a grant from National Park Service's Lower MS Delta Initiative, which has connected Delta State's International Conference on the Blues with MS Valley State University's BB King Day Symposium since 2018.
- The National Park Service has selected the Spirit of the Blues project as a Lower MS Delta Initiative success story to be featured on their new website being developed by the Eppley Institute for Parks and Public Lands at Indiana University.
- In response to COVID-19, <u>Delta State's 7<sup>th</sup> Annual International Conference on the Blues gave a virtual</u> <u>presentation in partnership with MS Delta Blues Festival Brazil Online</u>, a global festival that included performances from Holland, Australia, France, the United Kingdom, the United States, and Brazil. The presentation featured opening remarks from President LaForge and a Blues and Gospel performance from Delta State/DMI/College of Business alum Keith "Prince of the Delta Blues" Johnson, great nephew of Blues legend Muddy Waters. Portions of MS Valley State University's virtual BB King Day Symposium were included in the online presentation.

#### National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Most Southern Place on Earth workshops

• <u>The Most Southern workshop has been funded for an 11<sup>th</sup> year</u> (postponed until summer 2022 due to COVID-19). Over the 11-year period, the workshop has brought approximately \$2 million in NEH grant funds to Delta State.

• Based on expertise in administering this impactful experiential learning program, The Delta Center has been invited by the National Humanities Alliance (NEH advocacy organization) to participate in an upcoming Congressional briefing in Washington DC focused on K-12 education.

## **REGISTRAR'S OFFICE**

This year was mainly about trying to keep things going given all the additional work due to COVID-19. The Registrar's Office accomplishments were:

- Getting approval and funds for Degree Works to be purchased and implemented
- Revising all Registrar's Office forms and our processes to enable remote processing of all forms
- Cross-training all employees on various office procedures so we ensure continuity of service in case someone is out or a position is open
