Students answer multiple choice questions that pertain to foundation knowledge of social work. The data is collected and mailed to the University of Utah, BEAP office for tabulation and analysis. The results are sent back to Delta State University. A scale of 1-10 is used. A rating of 7.0 or above is considered successful.

#### 2. Field evaluations

Field instructors complete evaluation on students at end of semester. Surveys are tabulated. Score 9 (Excellent) to 1 (Poor) with the successful threshold of 5 or above being considered competent. All data is reviewed by faculty in the semester assessment outcomes meeting.

#### **Results of Evaluation**

#### **Use of Evaluation Results**

Results indicate a need to increase the student's awareness of the social work values. A values awareness assignment will be added to the Social Work Skills Class (SWO 305) and add additional content reinforced in the Field Seminar regarding values in the workplace. Also, faculty field instructors will review these elements at the beginning of the field experience and evaluate at mid semester with the student and the field liaisons.

#### **Data Collection (Evidence)**

1. **The Baccalaureate Foundation Curriculum Assessment Instrument (FCAI)** is given to students by the faculty while they are in their final class, SWO 481 Integrative Seminar. Students answer multiple choice questions that pertain to foundation knowledge of social work. The data is collected and mailed to the University of Utah, BEAP office for tabulation and analysis. The results are sent back to Delta State University. A scale of 1-10 is used. A rating of 7.0 or above is considered successful on the questions related to the policy section of this test.

2. **Field evaluations** completed by field instructors at the end of semester are tabulated. Scale 9 (Excellent) to 1 (Poor). A rating of 5 or above is considered competent.

#### **Results of Evaluation**

1. Data from FCAI N=26 Mean=6.02

2. *Field Evaluation* N=25 Mean=6.52

#### **Use of Evaluation Results**

These numbers remain below the acceptable threshold for policy practice. Assignments were added last year and there was some improvement so the department has chosen to continue with the previous class changes in the hopes of continuing improvement in the policy section. Policy remains one of the most difficult areas of social work practice.

**422**).Students must complete these assignments with a "C" to pass the class. A rating of 3.0 is considered competent.

All data is reviewed by faculty in the semester assessment outcomes meeting.

#### **Results of Evaluation**

*1. Data from FCAI* N=**25** Mean=**6.85** 

2. Practice Exercises SWO 422- 5 students made a "D" and did not pass the class.

#### **Use of Evaluation Results**

Five students did not pass the SWO 422 practice class and were not allowed to progress to field placement. Additional changes were made to the curriculum and further classroom participation with specific examples will be added to the course content. All students passed the Field seminar this year so efforts will continue to reinforce practice behavior as this is a key component of the social work licensure exam.

#### Delta State University Unit Level Report Department: Social Work Section IV.a Brief Description Narrative

The Bachelor of Social Work degree seeks to prepare students with professional knowledge, values, and skills for generalist social work practice, with the purpose of graduating social work practitioners who are able to function in a variety of settings with systems of all sizes. The department also offers a social welfare minor.

#### Section IV.c Diversity Compliance Initiatives and Progress Narrative

The department has a faculty ratio of 50-50 with two Caucasian faculty and two African-American faculty. All four faculty are female. The student body population of the social work department is 80% African American and 95% female. Respect for diversity issues is paramount to the Social Work department and to the social work profession. The department teaches a class that focuses on issues of diversity and this class is used as a general education offering. Additionally, the Council on Social Work Education requires the program to assess the social work students competence in the area of diversity prior to graduation. Diversity issues are reviewed in practice classes, the child welfare class, and the aging class.

#### Section IV.d Economic Development Initiatives and Progress Narrative

The Department of Social Work continues to sponsor workshops and conferences to benefit professional social workers in the state. These workshops are considered economic development because continuing education was offered free to social work field instructors and at a reduced rate for social work practitioners. This helps deter the cost of licensure renewal for social workers thus providing a service to the community. The department sponsored two workshops in the Spring, 2015 with 125 attending one and 156 attending the second. Three small workshops were held in the Fall, 2014 in coordination with NASW on ethics and workplace safety.

#### Narrative

The department offers classes which allow students in the University the opportunity to do volunteer work in public and non-profit agencies for credit or non-credit. The courses, SWO 101 Volunteering in the Community I and SWO 102 Volunteering in the Community II were offered three times total during the 2014-15 academic year. In these courses, students have the opportunity to offer needed skills which provide great economic benefit to the agencies. We also have five other classes that require volunteer work. In addition, the department has a field placement course that is required of all senior social work majors. Students are required to complete 440 hours in a social welfare agency. This past school year 25 senior students volunteered hours in agencies such as hospitals, hospices, nursing homes, Head Start centers, public health departments, school systems, mental health facilities, community action agencies, and Department of Human Services. Students also completed macro-research projects that created a new

service for the agencies. The Social Work Club does service projects in community agencies throughout the year.

Independent Sector, a coalition of leading nonprofits, foundations, and corporations that is designed to strengthen not-for-profit initiatives, philanthropy, and citizen action, states that the estimated dollar value of volunteer time is \$22.55 per hour for 2014 (Bureau of Labor on Statistics.) Students volunteered 16,158 hours in agencies in the 2014-15 academic school year for a total \$364,362.90 of services provided to the community. The department plans to continue these efforts in the 2015-16 school year.

The Advisory committee was very active as the number of majors increased and the inherent problems of GPA and ethical violations increased causing students not to graduate and complete courses as planned. The department continued to evaluate the educational offerings and licensure preparation of our students. Student grievance issues increased and the department created new forms and documents for data collection and documentation. Rubrics were created for all major course papers and assignments to allow for standardized grading of all students.

All faculty presented at two or more major conferences to allow for interaction with professional colleagues.

Service learning components were added to all practice classes.

Entrance/exit exam previously purchased from SWEAP was changed to a document created in the department. Each faculty member presented questions based on the core elements of the courses and the questions were compiled to create the exam that will be used to evaluate knowledge acquired in the program.

In the coming year the department will begin to use the Entrance/exit exam created in the department. Each faculty member presented questions based on the core elements of the courses and the questions were compiled to create the exam that will be used to evaluate knowledge acquired in the program. The first class to use this will be the incoming Fall, 2015 Introduction to Social Work class.

The department will begin to explore the possibility of a Master's Degree in Social Work. There has been continued interest in a program and the need is increasing for this offering.

Rubrics will be used in all classes for grading and low stakes assessment has been added to all classes offered during the first semester of the social work curriculum.

Additional online activities have been added to most classes and the department will continue to utilize social media and online activities to supplement class material.

The department will continue to provide educational workshops for area social workers.

The department will continue to work to develop new field placements for our students.
