INSTITUTIONAL MISSION

HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY

Delta State Teachers College was created by the Mississippi Legislature in 1924 with the following purpose: "to qualify teachers for the public schools of this state, by imparting instruction in the art and practice of teaching in all branches of study which pertain to common school education, and other such studies as the Board of Trustees may from time to time prescribe." Over the years changes in institutional purpose, reflected through increasing enrollment, expanded curriculum, and additional degree offerings resulted in name changes to Delta State College in 1955 and to Delta State University in 1974.

DESCRIPTION OF THE UNIVERSITY

Delta State is a public institution, receiving primary funding from the state; however, it also seeks and receives support from private and federal sources, as well as tuition revenue. The University provides a comprehensive undergraduate curriculum, offering 14 baccalaureate degrees in 44 majors. It also seeks to meet the need for advanced training in certain fields by providing programs of study for four master's degrees, the Educational Specialist degree, and the Doctor of Education degree.

Serving as the cultural and educational center of the region, Delta State University is located in Cleveland. The Mississippi Delta, a twenty-county, northwestern region, which is rich in various ethnic and cultural groups, provides approximately 80 percent of the University's enrollment. Between 10 and 15 percent of the students attend from other parts of the state, while slightly under 10 percent of the students reside outside the state. Accordingly, the University identifies the Delta as its primary public service region, while acknowledging the importance of research and service that will also benefit the state and nation.

PHILOSOPHY AND VALUES

The philosophy of Delta State is best expressed by its commitment to provide educational and cultural experiences designed to enhance and fulfill the potential of all persons without regard to race, religion, national origin, sex, or age. Furthermore, as students have diverse goals, backgrounds, and limitations on their finances, time, and mobility, the University, through its programs and support services, provides a variety of activities and growth opportunities. At the heart of its curriculum, the University provides an undergraduate education in the arts and sciences, business, education, and nursing. Graduate study in education and business and continuing education programs in a variety of areas also prepare the student for leadership roles. A comprehensive student affairs program is designed to support the academic structure of the University.

DESCRIPTION OF STUDENTS

Delta State offers these educational experiences to a student body from a broad range of cultural, socio-economic, and racial backgrounds. Twenty percent of the students belong to racial minority groups. Approximately 75 percent of its students, relatively balanced numerically by gender, attend the institution full-time, with 40 percent living in University housing. While many of its students come from middle socio-economic levels, the institution is committed to providing access and support for qualified students from all backgrounds. The numbers of students pursuing degrees in the Schools of Arts and Sciences, Business, and Education are comparable, with smaller numbers in the School of Nursing and in various pre-professional areas.

FUNCTIONS OF THE UNIVERSITY

The University provides an atmosphere conducive to intellectual, cultural, spiritual, moral, physical, and social development. While placing emphasis on the high quality of its instructional program, Delta State recognizes the close connection between instruction and scholarly research. To achieve its goals, the University retains an outstanding faculty, dedicated to teaching, creative scholarly activity, and public service. In each of these areas, the institution provides the necessary educational support, physical resources, and administrative services to create a community of scholars in which knowledge is both shared and generated.

SKILLS AND ATTITUDES ACQUIRED BY STUDENTS

The primary "product" of Delta State is its undergraduate student. The University provides a program in general, undergraduate education, emphasizing cultural development, communication, and computation, along with an understanding - both appreciative and critical - of human achievement. As a result, students develop the ability to understand and evaluate the thoughts of others and to express their own thoughts effectively. From their major discipline, students gain a depth of understanding in one or more fields of learning, including the techniques of research and performance identified with those fields. The University also strives to provide for students the opportunity to develop human relations skills through participation in extra-curricular activities and involvement with student organizations. Finally, graduates are encouraged to maintain close ties with the University as they make contributions to society whether through employment or advanced study.






ON-CAMPUS ENROLLMENT FULL-TIME/PART-TIME FALL, 1988



ON-CAMPUS ENROLLMENT BY RACE FALL, 1988




ON-CAMPUS ENROLLMENT BY SEX FALL, 1988




ENROLLMENT BY LEVEL



ON-CAMPUS ENROLLMENT RESIDENT/NONRESIDENT FALL, 1988




ON-CAMPUS ENROLLMENT BY SCHOOL FALL, 1988



ON-CAMPUS ENROLLMENT BY COUNTY




ON-CAMPUS HEADCOUNT ENROLLMENT 1979-1989







ANNUAL REPORT

KENT WYATT, PRESIDENT

JULY 1, 1988 - JUNE 30, 1989

The appropriation increase in 1988-89 enabled Delta State to make significant strides in its attempt to recover financially from the 22 percent cut of 1986-87. The \$11,377,323 allocation represented an increase of 19 percent. Coupled with the \$375,000 received in 1987-88, the University was able to recoup 85 percent of the budget reduction of 1986-87. The 1988-89 appropriation was still well below the University's 1985-86 appropriation of \$11,725,567.

With the 1988-89 allocation, Delta State was able to restore twenty positions, reinstate 50 percent of its travel budget, reestablish the Office of Continuing Education, meet an eight percent increase in utilities, and renew funding for faculty research. Through Senate Bill 2960, Laws of Mississippi, the State authorized bonds to be sold to fund repair and renovation projects. Delta State's share of these bond proceeds was \$1.6 million. This money was used for much needed roof repairs, street paving and parking, heating and air-conditioning repair, and plumbing work in the residence halls. It also enabled Delta State to modernize the Cafeteria and is being used to renovate the old city hospital into an instructional facility for the School of Nursing.

The University continued its tradition of expending the major portion of its budget on Academics. Expenditures for Instruction and Academic Support in 1988-89 represented 64 percent of the total Educational and General budget. Twenty percent was spent on Student Services and Institutional Support and two percent on Research and Public Service. The 9.42 percent expenditure on Operation and Maintenance was the lowest percent among the eight state-supported universities. The remaining 4.67 percent was spent on Scholarships and Fellowships.

Delta State maintained the pattern of enrollment growth it has established in recent years. During the fall Semester, the on-campus enrollment headcount was 3631, an increase of 3.7 percent over the previous year. This marked the fourth straight year the University has had an enrollment increase. From 1978 to 1988, Delta State on-campus enrollment increased 35 percent. During that same period on-campus enrollment in the system increased 2.7 percent.

The continuing trend of enrollment increases reflects very favorably on the health of the University. According to a recent study of the Office of Institutional Research and Planning, the strength and quality of its academic programs are the primary reasons students choose to attend Delta State. The pattern of enrollment growth affirms the University's commitment to excellence and quality in its instructional program.

The achievements of the Commercial Aviation Department are particularly noteworthy. Beginning in 1981 with seven majors, it has grown to more than 170 majors. The only program of its type in Mississippi, it is one of 33 in the nation that are accredited in Aviation Science by the Federal Aviation Administration. Supported in part by a grant from the FAA, the department has recently moved into new facilities for its twelve airplanes at the Cleveland airport and a new classroom building on campus. Additional national recognition is indicated by the location at Delta State of the headquarters of the National Intercollegiate Flying Association, with two national officers among the five faculty and five flight instructors.

The accomplishments of the Commercial Aviation Department are but one example of the excellence that characterizes academic programs at Delta State. All are supported by hardworking, diligent faculty who are committed to providing the very best education to our students.

The high points of the academic year were Honors Day and Commencement. Dr. Tom Meredith, President of Western Kentucky University was the guest speaker at Honors Day and Mr. Wilbur Hawkins, Director of the Lower Mississippi Delta Development Commission, gave the Commencement address. The University awarded 620 degrees, including two doctorates.

In recent years Delta State University has attempted to augment its teaching mission with some funds for faculty research. An increasing number of faculty are interested in doing research in collaboration with their

teaching, and accreditation agencies are looking more closely at research productivity among the faculty, particularly in graduate education. In response Delta State doubled the budget for faculty research from \$10,000 to \$20,000. This enabled the University to provide financial support for research to a record 27 faculty members. The University also created a half-time position for an academic research coordinator. This office will facilitate faculty efforts in developing proposals for research funding, conference presentations, and journal publications. Statistical and research design support will be provided to faculty interested in doing research.

Support for faculty development was also expanded in 1988-89. The University was able to budget \$20,000 in this area. This allowed academic departments the opportunity to bring in resource people with special expertise to do faculty workshops and enabled faculty to participate in training seminars aimed at improvement of teaching skills. Thirty-six faculty received faculty development awards in 1988-89.

The University also received a grant of \$70,000 from the BellSouth Foundation for faculty development in the School of Business. Funds will provide financial assistance for faculty internships and conferences and the completion of terminal degrees by School of Business faculty.

The BellSouth grant was but one of several awards made in response to Delta State's 1987-88 goal of increased emphasis on securing external funds. Excluding construction and financial aid, the University has already received \$128,000 more in external grants than in the previous year.

The 1987-88 merger of the Alumni Office and Foundation under one director also had a significant effect on contributions to the University in 1988-89. The Alumni/Foundation Office reported a record total of \$1.4 million received for four major projects. The proposed construction of an Alumni House has raised \$420,000. Even more ambitious was the drive to raise \$1 million for a B.F. Smith Chair for Economic Development. This endowed chair will give professional leadership to economic development efforts in the Delta. In a little over a year, the Foundation has received \$900,000 in pledges of support for the B. F. Smith Chair. This stands as a tribute, not only to the hard work of the Foundation, but also to the business and community leaders of the Delta who have contributed their efforts and resources to the project as a demonstration of their faith in the future of this part of the state.

In April 1989 Delta State further expanded its commitment to economic development by obtaining full status for its Small Business Development Center. This Center will improve the economic quality of life in the Delta by providing information, counseling, and assistance to persons who plan to start a small business or who presently operate a small business. It will provide the entrepreneur with education and training opportunities which cover a wide range of business topics. Research data will also be available, thus giving assistance to small businesses in decision making.

The University has also intensified its long-range planning efforts. The Director of Institutional Research title has been changed to Director of Institutional Research and Planning. This key position, in conjunction with the Long-Range Planning Committee, has initiated a program of institutional effectiveness. Establishing institutional and student outcome goals and assessing the extent to which these goals are accomplished will further improve the quality of the instructional program at Delta State.

The 1988-89 year was a positive and encouraging year for Delta State. The \$1.8 million increase in funding moved the University closer to recovery from the disastrous cuts of 1986-87. It was also a demonstration of strong support from the Legislature, not only for Delta State, but for higher education in our State. The 1988 enrollment increase of 3.7 percent, and 35 percent increase in enrollment over the last ten years signified the quality of Delta State's reputation. Moving into 1989-90 Delta State will work hard to sustain that quality and affirm the confidence placed in it by our loyal students, faculty, alumni, and friends.
