Welcome to the latest addition of DSU's Music Notes. Once again, our department has changed with the addition of new faculty, an ensemble, and the approval of a music production program.

As you may know, the Music Department lost its long-time accompanist, Lois Hobbs-Yu, who moved to Memphis. We are pleased to have Dr. Kumiko Shimizu join

us as our accompanist. Most recently from Eugene, Oregon, she comes to us with a wealth of experience and great enthusiasm. The department also hired Dr. John Wojcik as the new Director of Bands. He comes from Texas A & M-Corpus Christi, where he was director for four years. Less than a month into the semester, Dr. Wojcik has done an exemplary job in balancing the demands of marching band and wind ensemble with teaching and getting to know students and faculty. Our department continues to diversify with the addition of a new applied area. Patrick Flynn joins us

from the Memphis area to teach classical guitar. We are also pleased to announce that Dr. Kimberly Broadwater and Anne Gray have been hired this year as halftime instructors in voice. Dr. Broadwater will also be teaching the History of Rock and Roll class this fall.

We are also excited about the arrival of our new steel drums and the performance and outreach possibilities they will bring to DSU. Larry Bradford, instructor of percussion, will lead this ensemble comprised of twelve students.

After much planning and research, the department received word in June that NASM has approved our newest degree, the Bachelor of Arts in Sound Recording Technology. This program will enable students to diversify their musical training by exploring the production of music in a new, state-of-the-art facility.

The department continues to grow in majors and is reaching many more non-majors through participation in ensembles and our popular fine-arts classes--History of Rock and Roll and Music in American Culture. We have the largest group of piano majors in recent history with an enrollment close to twenty students.

I encourage you to explore our website which details our upcoming symposia and honor choir band weekends. You will also find information about our faculty, ensembles, scholarship opportunities and other areas of interest. #### DR. KIMBERLY BROADWATER - Voice

Dr. Kimberly Broadwater, a native of Cleveland, MS, has accepted the position of Assistant Professor of Voice at Delta State University. Dr. Broadwater has served as the Director of Arts Education at the Bologna Performing Arts Center. Dr. Broadwater received the Bachelor of Music Degree at DSU, the Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees at Louisiana State University. She arrived at DSU with experience as a voice teacher from Louisiana State University, Delta State University, and the Academy of Music in Covington. She is the Auditions Chair of the Mississippi Chapter of the National Association of Teachers of Singing and the Regional Chapter of the National Association of Teachers of Singing. Dr. Broadwater continues an active pursuit of research in vocal pedagogy, including the role of the hyoglossus in singing, the historical perspectives of vocal pedagogy, and environmental versus genetic affects on the singing voice.

#### DR. PATRICK FLYNN - Classical Guitar

S. Patrick Flynn was born in Dallas, TX. He currently resides in Memphis, TN with his wife Linda. He began playing the guitar at the age of thirteen. He was awarded his Bachelor of Fine Arts Degree from Florida Atlantic University. He was later awarded his Master of Music and Doctorate of Musical Arts Degrees from the University of Memphis, where he worked as an assistant under the direction of Lily Afshar. He just recently finished his dissertation on "The Revival of the Classical Guitar Duet Medium through Ida Presti and Alexandre Lagoya." As a performer, Patrick has studied guitar performance and pedagogy with many of the world's greatest performers and teachers. In addition to his activities as a performer and teacher, he also enjoys playing and coaching competitive tennis throughout the mid-south.

### DR. KUMIKO SHIMIZU - Accompanist

Kumiko Shimizu completed her Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of Oregon, where she had been a piano student of Victor Steinhardt and studied accompanying and opera coaching with Gregory Mason. She had been the rehearsal pianist at Eugene Opera for five years. She has played for productions of Aida, La Traviata, Tosca, La Bohème, The Marriage of Figaro (including basso continuo). La Cenerentola, Pagliacci, and Susannah, among others. She has toured with Lake George Opera in its outreach program for elementary schools (performing for more than 15,000 students!) and new program for junior and high schools in 2003. In addition to the performances with Lake George Opera in New York and Vermont, she has toured with the Natchez Opera Festival/Natchez Festival of Music in Mississippi and Louisiana, Opera Idaho in Idaho, and Rimrock Opera in Montana and Wyoming for their outreach concerts and/or educational programs. While serving as an Assistant Musical Director/Accompanist at the Natchez Opera Festival (2003), she gave a lecture/recital on Japanese art songs at the festival's lecture series. She has a master's degree from the University of Maine, where she performed frequently as a chamber musician. She has studied with many notable artists in master classes and workshops, including Lorin Hollander, Robert McDonald, John Browning, and Stephen Hough. For the Oregon Bach Festival (2000), she was an accompanist for the conducting master classes. She was with the Oregon Festival of American Music for their production of My Fair Lady in summer 2004.

### DR. JOHN WOJCIK - Director of Bands

Dr. John Wojcik has joined the Delta State University music faculty as Associated Professor of Music and Director of Bands. Prior to coming to DSU, Dr. Wojcik was Director of Bands at Texas A & M-Corpus Christi where he was Director of Bands and the Instructor of Trumpet. From 1989 to 2001, Wojcik was Director of Bands at Graceland University in Lamoni, Iowa. Dr Wojcik has also taught in the Enid, Oklahoma Public School System. He received the Bachelor of Music Education degrees from Michigan State University, the Master of Music degree from the University of Oklahoma, and the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Kansas.

### CHORALE PERFORMS AT CARNEGIE HALL

In the early morning hours (4:30 a.m.) of Saturday, March 5, thirty-five sleepy-eyed college singers began loading a bus to travel to the Memphis International Airport. Their final destination – New York City, Carnegie Hall.

Under the direction of guest conductors William Carroll and Welborn Young, the Delta State University Chorale joined forces with other collegiate and community choirs from North Carolina, Maryland, and Minnesota in a concert with full orchestra in America's premier performance space on Monday, March 7, 2005. The program included Randall Thompson's "Frostiana" and Howard Hanson's "Song of Democracy."

The choirs rehearsed throughout the weekend, with a final run-through with the orchestra on the day of the concert. The Chorale also had the opportunity to give a brief performance on the Carnegie Hall stage in front of the other participants a few hours before the concert.

During rehearsal breaks, the students experienced much of what New York has to offer, including visits to Times Square, Central Park, the Empire State Building, Metropolitan Museum of Art, St. Thomas Church, St. Patrick's Cathedral, Metropolitan Opera, New York City Opera, and numerous Broadway shows. A group of five students even appeared on the set of ABC's "Good Morning America." After Monday night's performance, all of the participants were treated to a post-concert cruise highlighting the Manhattan evening skyline as well as the Statue of Liberty.

The morning of our scheduled departure, a major snowstorm hit the New York area, "forcing" us to stay in Manhattan for another evening of musicals, operas, and for some, much needed rest. Our sincere thanks goes out to everyone who contributed to this memorable experience.

# CHOIRS RELEASE TWO CD RECORDINGS

The DSU choral program has recently released two compact disc recordings. Still, Still, Still: Holiday Carols from Delta State University is a live recording of our 2004 holiday concert. This recording features all three DSU choral ensembles and includes seasonal music and familiar carols.

English Choral Gems was recorded by the DSU Chamber Singers at the end of the spring 2005 semester. This recording features anthems and motets by composers such as Benjamin Britten, Harold Darke, Edward Elgar, Herbert Howells, Hubert Parry, and Charles Villiers Stanford. The choir is accompanied on the organ by Dr. Mark Butler, Professor of Music at Delta State University and Organist Choirmaster at St. James' Episcopal Charch in Greenville.

THE DSU OPERA THEATER enjoyed a successful year in 2004-05. After collaborating with Literally Alive, a children's theater presenter in New York, the Opera Theater staged The Ugly Duckling to a sold-out audience. Prior to the performance, the students in Opera Theater also conducted workshops on the opera for area school children. These workshops were designed to introduce the audience to the opera while providing hands-on teaching experience for the students enrolled in Opera Theater. The Ugly Duckling presentation was the initial offering of a three-year plan to stage literary-based works by Hans Christian Anderson. The production for the 2005-06 year, to be presented April 13, 2006, will be The Little Mermand.

Many new students are enrolled in Opera Theater this year, and the group is excited to be included in the December 2005 "A Holiday Extravaganza" with the choral groups in the Department of Music. St. Nicholas. a Christmas opera will be staged with orchestra as an intermezzo between the choral offerings. Beside their labors of singing and acting, the DSU Opera students also enjoyed travelling to see Mississippi Opera productions of Gianni Schiechi and Pagliacei in Jackson, MS.

#### CHOIR PERFORMANCES

The DSU Chamber Singers participated in a Choral Evensong service at St. James' Episcopal Church in Greenville on October 9. On Sunday, November 20, the Chamber Singers and Delta Singers will present their fall concert at 4.00 p.m. at First United Methodist Church in Cleveland.

Don't miss "A Holiday Extravaganza," featuring the DSU Chorale, DSU Opera Theatre, and the Mississippi Valley State University Choir. This event will take place on Sunday, December 4, at 3:00 p.m. in the Bologna Performing Arts Center. The Opera Theatre will present St. Nicholas, a Christmas opera produced by St. James Press and written by Richard Shepherd. The work showcases a funny version of the legend of St. Nicholas and the three gold coins. The composer incorporates three Christmas carols into the score, and these carols are sung throughout the piece. The opera sees Mary and Joseph on their journey to Bethlebem, and St. Nicholas imparts his message of Christmas - "We give because God gave to us the greatest gift of all." The DSU Chorale and MVSU Choir will each sing a variety of holiday pieces, and then combine to perform Vivaldi's "Gloria" with orchestra to conclude the program.

## CHOIRS PLAN TOUR TO ENGLAND

Plans are underway for singers from all three DSU choirs to travel to England in May 2006 to participate in the York Minster International Choral Festival. This five-day festival brings together choirs from across the world to sing with internationally-known conductor and composer Bob Chilcott. At the conclusion of the festival, we will remain in England for five additional days, performing in Stratford-upon-Avon, Oxford, and London.

Our itinerary also includes guided tours through several musical, literary, and historical sites, including: York Minster and the Jorvik Viking Center in York; many of William Shakespeare's properties in Stratford-upon-Avon; Christ Church College, the Bodleian Library, and Ashmolean Museum in Oxford; as well as Buckingham Palace and St. Paul's Cathedral in London.

Bays and Washington D.C. drummer Sean Rickman toured and recorded with the late guitar-keyboard virtuoso Shawn Lane, who has been featured repeatedly in every major music publication. Bays and Rickman, along with DSU graduate Todd Bobo and keyboardist Tommy Priakos, were the backing band for artists Andy Timmons, Craig Erickson, Sean O'Donnell, Stan Lassiter, Johnny Holiday, Chris Nix, and Ed DeGenaro.

Recently released recordings featuring Bays include Charlie Worsham's "Saturday Night, Sunday Morning", Jay Ruffin's "Skeleton Key", Olga's "Kiss Your Blues Away", and Chris Cotton's "I Watched the Devil Die." He will also appear upcoming release by the Beat Daddys and Charlie Worsham.

Bays performed for Thacker Mountain Radio with the Bluff City Backsliders. Poet/Musician Michael Graber, who plays mandolin with the Bluff City Backsliders, read from his debut book of poems "The Last Real Medicine Show,"

With Terry "Big T." Williams, Bays performed in New York City's Central Park for the 26th Annual New York Mississippi Picnic in June. Other performances include shows for the Viking Cooking School Series, the 18th Sunflower River Blues & Gospel Festival, the Lauren Rogers Museum of Art's 12th Annual Blues Bash, National Library Week, the Elvis Presley Festival (opening for Chuck Berry), Morgan Freeman's Ground Zero Blues Club, and special performances for Wake Forest University and Western Carolina State University.

On September 10<sup>th</sup> Bays performed in New York with Ruby Jane Smith for Olympus Fashion Week. The musicians were featured on the runway alongside the models for designers Natalie Chanin and Enrico Marone-Cinzano.

With Miss Mississippi 2005 Kristian Dambrino, Bays has performed at the Bach To Blues Series, the Alluvian Hotel, benefits for St. Jude Children's Hospital and Relay for Life, Nashville venues the Bluebird and Douglas Corner, and will be featured for three nights at the Peabody Hotel in Memphis, TN.

Bays, along with P. Renee Foster, contributed to Dr. Stephen A. King's book Reggue, Rastafari, and the Rhetoric of Social Control. Since its publication, professors at recognized Research I institutions, including the University of North Carolina and Yale University, have used the book in their undergraduate and graduate courses. In addition, a number of University libraries across the country have added the book to their respective collections. Dr. Mary Lenn Buchanan, Professor of Voice and Opera, was fortunate to enjoy a semester of sabbatical leave during the Spring of 2005. During her sabbatical, she did return to the DSU campus to stage the children's matinee production of The Ugly Duckling and to coordinate the North Mississippi Metropolitan Opera National Council auditions. She continues her duties as the North Mississippi auditions chair in the 2005-06 year. The 2005 Metropolitan Opera auditions drew eleven singers to the Bologna Performing Arts Center for a day of beautiful operatic presentations. This season's auditions will be held January 28, 2006. During the 2004-05 school year, Dr. Buchanan attended conferences and adjudicated competitions for the National Association of Teachers of Singing in Monroe, LA and Raymond, MS. She also served as a regional representative on the NATS national foundation board. In the past year, Dr. Buchanan had the opportunity to travel to Minneapolis, MN for the Music Educators National Conference and to attend the Louisiana State University's opera production of John Adamo's Little Women. Dr. Buchanan's sabbatical research centered on the works of 20th century, jazz-influenced composer Peter Saltzman. She can be heard in recital later in the academic year lecturing on and performing a group of his works entitled A "Song of Songs" Cycle, drawn from Biblical texts in the Song of Solomon.

Dr. Mark Butler, Professor of Music, presented a workshop session for the Mississippi Chapter of the American Orff Schulwerk Association in August 2005 at the University of Mississippi in Oxford. He also served as registrar for the Mississippi Conference on Church Music and Liturgy. He will be organist for the DSU Chamber Singers presentation of a choral evensong at the St. James' Episcopal Church in Greenville in October 2005 and their concert in Cleveland in November. Butler begins a second three-year term on the DSU Teacher Education Council this semester as well. He is past president of the Mississippi Alliance for Arts Edication (MAAE).

Dr. Andrea Cheeseman, Assistant Professor of Woodwinds, performed at the 3oth Annual Oklahoma Clarinet Symposium. At this festival, she performed a half recital, playing music of Robert Muczynski and Dana Wilson. This symposium is the largest of its kind other than that sponsored by the International Clarinet Association. This fall, Cheeseman shall present a recital in Memphis and a chamber music concert at DSU, collaborating with string players of the Arkansas and Memphis Symphonies.

### Faculty News, continued


Dr. Karen Foshelm, Professor of Music, attended the Institute for Pedagogy of World Music Theories at the University of Colorado, Boulder this past June. This week-long event, sponsored by the College Music Society, is designed to allow participants the opportunity to explore the idea of integrating a variety of musical systems into individual courses and the music curricula. Also in June, Dr. Fosheim presented a masterclass to pre-college pianists at Brecksville Music Center in Brecksville, OH. Dr. Fosheim is chair of the ROMEA Conference on Teaching in Higher Education which was held at DSU on September 28, 2005.

Dr. Paul Hankins, Professor of Trumpet, assumed responsibility for the DSU Jazz Ensemble in January and was recently named Director of Jazz Ensembles. In April, the ensemble performed with great success at the Alcorn State University Jazz Festival in Vicksburg, MS and was included in a Mississippi Public Television broadcast featuring the event. The band will perform its annual Fall concert on November 17 in the BPAC.

In other news, Hankins was named Chair of the Student Engagement Champions Committee, a University committee charged with identifying areas of need or opportunity for enhancing learning environments and increasing student engagement as part of the University's Quality Enhancement Plan.

Dr. Keith Pettway, Professor of Flute was the guest artist for the Syrinx Festival in Winnipeg, Canada May 29-31. This is a major flue festival in Canada. As guest artist, Dr. Pettway opened the festival with a solo recital of music by American and Canadian composers. The next two days he spent teaching masterclasses and judging advanced high school through young professional flutists.

This was a great honor for Dr. Pettway, and helped spread the reputation of Delta State internationally. The Syrinx Festival has a long history and has hired some of the best known names in flute performance and teaching as the guest artist. The concert was well received with numerous curtain calls and encores.
